MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Council has recently been advised that the Government of Alberta is changing long-standing funding arrangements. One of those changes affects how policing is paid for. As a result, the Village of Kitscoty will now be responsible for a significant portion of policing costs, and this will lead to a municipal tax increase.

Municipalities operate under provincial authority and rely mostly on property taxes and grants to provide everyday services like water, sewer, fire protection, roads, and sidewalks. Over the years, some costs that were once covered by the province have been shifted to municipalities. A familiar example is Alberta's education tax. While it appears on your property tax bill, the Village simply collects it and sends it to the province, it does not support local services.

The province's funding comes from non-renewable resource royalties (oil and gas), personal and corporate income taxes, federal transfers and investment income. Until about ten years ago, policing for communities our size was fully funded by the province, that has changed. While the early costs were manageable, they are now expected to rise significantly. By 2030, Kitscoty's policing costs are projected to more than double, reaching nearly **\$110,000 per year**, and this cost must be paid directly by the Village.

Because property tax is our main source of revenue, Council has few options. To cover these new costs while continuing to provide essential services, a municipal tax increase will be necessary. Council has worked hard to keep the mill rate stable for many years, but this change in funding makes that increasingly difficult. We remain committed to managing your tax dollars responsibly and advocating for fair funding for small communities.

GRIEF AND LOVE

"Grief is really just love. It's all the love you want to give, but cannot. All that unspent love gathers up in the corners of your eyes, the lump in your throat, and in that hollow part of your chest. Grief is just love with no place to go." – William P. Spence

For many people, February brings added opportunities to reflect on love and relationships. However, this can come with potential difficulty for those experiencing grief and loss. The above quote provides a perspective about grief that acknowledges the love that we have as being ongoing and not something that ends when someone dies. Finding ways to continue expressing our love can be a helpful way to give your love somewhere to go.

Consider the following activities to honour your experiences of grief and love:

1. Write a love letter to your loved one who has passed. Take time to find some special paper or a notebook. You can write about memories, things you miss about the person, things you wish you could tell them, etc. You may choose to keep the letter, leave it at a gravesite, or dispose of it in a way that feels comfortable to you.
2. Take part in your loved one's favourite activity. Ask yourself, what did my loved one *love* to do? Even if it is not something that you particularly love, it may help you to reflect on memories by participating in something they enjoyed doing. This can be an extension of your ongoing love and your desire to keep their memories alive.
3. Continue to use your loved one's name out loud. Share stories that use their name and help others in your life to also continue to love your person.
4. Create a memory box for your loved one. This can be done in as simple or elaborate way as you choose. Some people may like to purchase a special box while others may like to create their own. Think about what personal items, pictures, letters, song lyrics, or other things that you can fill the box with.
5. Allow yourself to feel all the emotions that come with wanting to continue loving someone who is not physically here. There may be times of deep sadness mixed in with joyfulness that come with remembering the special times you spent with your loved one.

By choosing to actively express your love, you can seek to accept that missing your loved one is proof that you loved them dearly and that your love will continue.

SNOW REMOVAL AND SANDING FOR ROADWAYS

As we prepare for the upcoming winter weather please be reminded that the Village of Kitscoty provides snow removal and ice control on municipal streets according to determined priorities. These priorities are set out in Policy PW 001 and are illustrated below.

Priority #1— Village entrances and exits, Emergency routes, main School bus routes, Water Reservoir and Lift Station access;

Priority #2— Any streets not identified as Priority #1;

Priority #3— Lane ways and back alleys

REMINDER TO OUR RESIDENTS: In accordance with Community Standards Bylaw No. 10-2017 a person shall remove snow and ice from any sidewalk adjacent to Property they Own or Occupy within 48 hours after the snow or ice has been deposited. **A Person shall not deposit snow or ice upon any Road, Public Place or Property that is not their own.**

ADDITIONAL REMINDERS:

- Please refrain from crossing extension cords across sidewalks
- All curb ramps must be removed
- Please do not shovel onto village owned properties (ie: alleys and roads). The only exception of this is the Commercial areas.
- Please be mindful of Public Works when they are removing snow. Stay back 15 ft from the equipment and do not pass while equipment is in operation.
